English



Students will continue to expand their vocabulary with 'Words of the Week, this will be promoted during tutor time and lessons. It has been fantastic to see students using higher level vocabulary in the academy. There will also be prizes for students who can use the 'Word of the Week' in the correct context.

We will also continue to share the 'Literacy Tip of the Week' to help students improve the accuracy of their writing.



There will be new literacy challenges each week for students to complete in their Google classrooms. All completed entries will be entered into a prize draw. We have had lots of winners so far for their brilliant work.

English will be continuing to promote 'Reading for pleasure' in the LRC with new competitions to kick start our reading off this year.



Pupils will also be starting their new Read Aloud books over the next few weeks.

Maths



Maths will be continuing with our keywords and definitions each lesson on new learning.

Students will be creating a definition of their own for all the keywords for the new themes they are studying.jjj

Science



Students continue to build up subject glossaries in their books, containing relevant key scientific terms and their definitions. 'Out There Science' will take place once per topic, with a read aloud news story based on relevant scientific issues.

History



We will be continuing with our recommended reads for KS3, which coincide with the unit we are studying and appear on our assessment checkpoints. We will also be continuing to practise read aloud with all year groups, to help unpick key words and phrases.

Geography



At KS3 students will be continuing to link lessons to the core geographical concepts as well as learning new key words for each unit studied. At KS4 students will be completing numerous recap and recall activities, which involve using specific geographical language to prepare for their exam.

To raise literacy attainment at every level of ability across all phases of a child's education - **supporting every child to be a reader.** We have a responsibility to promote and enhance students' literacy levels working together to systematically integrate the skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing across our curriculum. This will maximise the potential of each student and prioritise good literacy skills for learning and life.





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Spanish



Y7 will be practising double letter sounds in Spanish phonics this month: r,rr,l,ll. Y9 will be reading job applications before writing their own. KS4 will be improving their range of vocabulary and recognition of tenses to be able to read for detail.

Art and Design



Students will be looking at and learning the art dictionary key words when they look at the Pop Art Movement in year 7 and they will be recorded in their sketchbooks.

In year 8 students will be looking at African Culture and will also be recording these in their sketchbooks art dictionary.



In year 9 students will be looking at Portraiture or Natural Forms (dependent on their teacher) and keywords will also be read aloud to support students who may struggle to read and comprehend each word or meaning.

Students in years 10 & 11 will be starting component 2 (the exam unit) and will be using annotations to support their artwork creations and presentation of ideas and developments. The art library is also easily accessible for further research, progress and independence and available for all year groups.

Drama



In drama we are focusing on play texts that are used to develop people's understanding of the world, in year 8 we are exploring Blood Brothers which explores many different themes that will improve people's perception of the world. In year 10 we are working with the author Mark Wheeler, Mr Appleby is in the process of organising a visit form Mark to discuss the script writing process.

Music



Literacy in music and musical literacy are learned simultaneously and build on each other for holistic literacy and disciplinary learning in music.

For example, reading about a song and discussing its meaning using key concepts such as the elements of music leads to a deeper understanding of the effect of the sound on the audience and the ways that this effect has been created. Conversely, musical notation communicates the sound to be performed and the sound itself speaks to the audience.

Design & Tech



Keywords and terminology associated with D&T/Food will now be fully embedded into all projects within each year group. The main focus of January will be learning to use the terms and words within the correct context. In year 11, discussions will take place in a revision session on interpreting the different types of examination questions and their meaning.

PE



We will continue to use key words in Year 7 and 8 PE for each of the sports that are being covered. These will include football, fitness, OAA, badminton and basketball. In year 9, 10 and 11 theory lessons we will ensure key words are used appropriately in leadership coursework.

Life



All students in Life are supported in reading with keywords of their Topic Learning Sheets and under pinned with a wide suggested reading list that can help students develop more information around the subjects that they are studying. As part of their learning, students use a 'Cornell Notes" style page to help with keywords and concepts.

ICT



The focus for this term will be on technical language and vocabulary. For KS4 this will take the form of subject specific language that will be used in their GCSE examination.

We have a weekly Literacy meeting where a targeted group of students are considered for a range of interventions. This is put in place and we monitor the impact of this using the STAR Reader Tests.

STAR Reader Tests Taking place this week

These important milestone tests are conducted in assessment conditions once every half term in English lessons to accurately gauge progress in reading and language.



During the academic year, all students will take STAR reading tests on the accelerated reader programme. This will give them their reading age and ZPD code so that they can select a book from the library (LRC). Please look at p25 of your child's planner, where they will have recorded their results and you can clearly see your child's reading age. There are lots of different genres and choices within each ZPD code.

ENGLISH HOMEWORK

As part of their English homework, we encourage all students to read for 30 minutes each day. All students also have access to myON, an online library.


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

Strategies for supporting your child at home:

- Be interested- ask about the book daily plot, characters, themes, predictions
- Be sensitive- ensure students have chance to discuss delicate themes that arise
- Be aware- feel free to purchase and read the book that your child is reading (as long as they don't jump ahead in the book beyond their peers!)
- Be relaxed- offer a calm, stress-free environment that cultivates enthusiasm and a joy of reading
- Be an example- let your child see you reading for pleasure on a regular basis at home
